When Lee Ferron first went to dinner with Emilio, his young mentee at Casa Chirilagua, he could have never imagined all they would experience together over the next 12 years. From homework help to sharing everyday chats over fast food fries, each gathering held a purpose bigger than the moment.

This past December, Emilio's community - consisting of Lee, our co-founder Dawnielle, our board chair Fredy and many others - cheered Emilio on as he crossed the stage at Virginia Tech and became the first in his family to graduate college. What a celebration!

For the past 15 years, Casa
Chirilagua has been gathering with
purpose, seeking to love our
neighbors as ourselves. We didn't
start as a nonprofit. It was simply a
way of life for our founders, who
moved into the neighborhood to
live among, listen to, learn from,
and love their immigrant
neighbors. This commitment to
relationships blossomed into the
nonprofit we are today. It still
drives everything we do!

Our 2022 included rest and recovery from the difficult season of the pandemic. Our Program Director Marissa and I were each able to take a three-month sabbatical.

This time of rest was vital and set us up to return to Casa Chirilagua with focused vision.

Last year was also filled with meaningful connections, whether helping the 3rd-grade girls with their homework in Kids Club or discussing verses during middle school Bible study. We toured college campuses with Casa to College students and shared community-wide meals together. Each gathering was an opportunity to show and share love with our neighbors.

Your prayers, financial support, volunteered time, and encouragement made this possible. Because of your support, the Leadership Pipeline at Casa Chirilagua is bursting at the seams. The Casa to College Program almost doubled from 11 participants to 17 last year! Young leaders are eager for growth and looking ahead to a brighter future.

Like Emilio's story, we are now seeing fruit from the seeds planted in the program's early days.

More than 44% of Latino students are the first in their families to go to college.

You are helping break the college barrier! We are equipping a new class of first-generation college students like Emilio.

Our focused vision into 2023 and beyond is that every student in our Leadership Pipeline will learn and practice vital leadership skills, graduate high school, and have a solid post-high school plan. These future leaders will contribute to their families and communities as the Oaks of Righteousness - God's promise in Isaiah 61.

There is a lot of rewarding work to be done, and we cannot wait to see every child in Chirilagua have access to this same pathway!

Thank you for joining us on this journey. Together we continue to develop relationships with families to see the Chirilagua neighborhood transformed by Christ.


